GETTING STARTED: THE WHAT, HOW AND WHY OF VIRTUAL EXCHANGE

Higher Education Institutions in Europe are undergoing significant change, aiming at transforming into open campuses and at creating impact for the so-called twin transformation (green and digital transformation). This transformation may significantly challenge institutional structures as well as intra- and inter-institutional collaboration. In this context, virtual exchange plays an important role in facilitating sustainable exchange and in developing global competences of students as future change agents. This lecture will look at the potential of Virtual Exchange (VE) as a pedagogical approach in the development of global competences and how this may be strategically integrated in higher education curricula. Drawing from findings from ongoing research projects, the lecture will touch on questions such as the following:

- > What are the most common types of VE?
- > What contributions to the internationalisation of the curriculum can VE make?
- > What practical considerations are essential for the successful implementation of VE?
- > Which blocking and enabling factors will need to be considered when planning a project?
- > What VE design and methodological aspects facilitate (global competence) learning?

Workshop 1: "Virtual Exchange Vision Map" – Patrick Studer, Jacqueline Bürki (Swiss Global Competence Lab) [hybrid]

In this workshop, participants will develop a vision map that outlines concrete steps towards designing and embedding VE in their sphere of influence. The workshop will address factors key to planning VE, which include defining the VE project; identifying relevant graduate attributes and learning outcomes; developing a pedagogical mentoring and support structure; developing rich collaborative tasks and reflection opportunities; evaluating VE outcomes through assessment and feedback.

Workshop 2: "Implementing Diverse (Deep and Sprint) COIL practices, from setup to curriculum integration" – Reinout Klamer (THUAS)

The workshop highlights the differences in the approaches to COIL, COIL formats (Sprint and Deep COIL) and the practical consequences for setting up your practice. Participants will learn how COIL can be implemented at Bachelor's, Master's, or continuing education level, and which knowledge and learning competences can be fostered among students and academics. There will be plenty of interaction and support for academics to develop their ideas into more concrete proposals.

Workshop 3: "Practical Insights into COIL projects" – Nicholas Sinn (HM) Virtual Exchange (VE) is a fantastic tool we can use to get more out of our lessons, while students, from experience, can also benefit enormously from. This workshop will highlight some of the benefits of VE, some challenges in its implementation, and some practical insights. It will help educators who wish to engage in Virtual Exchange to get started and will provide an opportunity for those who have experience with VE to share their stories.

Workshop 4: "Join this COIL Cooking Class: How to COIL in a good way? A recipe for success" – Eline Duine (THUAS) [hybrid]

<u>The ingredients</u>: Enthusiasm, clear communication, cultural sensitivity, technological proficiency, patience, and creativity.

<u>Method</u>: Blend enthusiasm with communication, fold in cultural sensitivity, add technological proficiency gradually, sprinkle with patience and creativity, and bake in a supportive environment.

Patrick is the head of the research unit Language Management and Globalisation at the ZHAW Institute of Language Competence and the founder of the Swiss Global Competence Lab.
